Goals

Code	Goal
C1	The central goal of this course is to analyze the phenomenon of globalization and regionalization in the world economy. During the classes, students learn about the most important theories of regional economic integration and the premises of cooperation between states that make up regional groups.
C2	The participants analyse whether the tightening relations between countries in close geographical neighbourhood can be seen as a response to the challenges of contemporary globalization processes. The considerations are conducted on the example of the largest regional groupings, such as the European Union (EU), the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN), the Common Market of the South (MERCOSUR); as well as currency regimes such as the euro area and trade regimes such as the North American Free Trade Area (NAFTA) and the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP).
C3	Finally, the course deals with the current mass-based backlash against globalization and discuss its possible sources.
