Assessment: Everyone is expected to take a written exam in the form of a book review. The exam ranges (1) the topics introduced during the course by the instructor, (2) the required reading (Kothari, C.R. (2004), Research Methodology: Methods and Techniques, 2nd edition, New Age International Publishers, New Delhi.), and (3) one book selected by a student. Students are expected to choose and read a book that concerns international relations theories, methodology or presents empirical research on international relations. Then, a student hat to talk through the issues assigned to a missed class. Credit: (1) Everyone is expected to deliver an oral presentation on a selected topic during the course.
