Classes	1. Students are obliged to deliver an academic essay or a written report or a part of a research paper on a topic assigned by the tutor.  Written work is evaluated according to the criteria: a) Task achievement (0-5); b) Composition (0-5); Grammar (0-5); c) Vocabulary (general / academic) (0-5); d) Coherence & cohesion (0-5).  Maximum number of points to be scored is 25. Grading thresholds: 25-23 - 5.0; 22-21 - 4.5; 20-18 - 4.0; 17-16 - 3.5; 15-13 - 3.0. 2. Oral/multimedia presentation. In order to receive credit, the student must prepare and deliver a multimedia presentation on a given topic based on the professional literature (scientific articles; research papers), discuss the research hypothesis and research methodology, taking into account the characteristics typical of academic discourse. The presentation will be evaluated based on the following criteria: 1) Task achievement (0-10); 2) Language performance (0-10); 3) Use of multimedia (0-5). Grading thresholds: 25-23 - 5.0; 22-21 - 4.5; 20-18 - 4.0; 17-16 - 3.5; 15-13 - 3.0.
