Code	Goal
C1	The course aims to: C1. introduce students to ethnographic filmmaking, its history, as well as epistemological and methodological paradigms and ethical challenges C2. familiarize students with the specificity of visual anthropology as a subdiscipline of sociocultural anthropology C3. introduce students to the most important anthropological films as well as other media that shaped the contemporary state-of-the-art in visual anthropology, Students will gain a thorough understanding of ethnographic film, its origins, development and contemporary challenges from its earliest inspirations and experiments to the most contemporary and innovative works. The course will consist of screenings of documentary films that shaped or formed the core of visual anthropology, paired with an introduction to the respective theoretical debates about the place and practice of ethnographic filmmaking in the discipline of anthropology. The course will also allow students to engage in critical debates on screened films and consider the place of audio-visual media in the discipline of ethnology/cultural anthropology. The course aims to construe a theoretical introduction to the use of film as a research method, a form of intersubjective engagement and an alternative medium of representation in anthropology. The course will be of particular interest to students of Social Sciences and Humanities, particularly in the fields of cultural anthropology, sociology, cultural studies, film studies and history.

Activities Credit conditions Conversatory classes Students are expected to attend all lectures and seminars (to pass students must not have more than one unauthorised absence). To successfully pass the course, students are required to read compulsory texts, prepare for each class and actively participate in seminar discussions (10 % of the final mark). The assessment for this course takes two forms. Students will be expected to submit a midterm assignment (20% of the final mark) and the final essay (70% of the final mark) and receive a final grade of 3 (sufficient) or above. The topics of mid-term assignment and the final essay are directly related to the course teaching content. The mid-term and final assignments will be marked according to student's ability to fulfil the following criteria: Thesis and Argumentation Clarity of Thesis: The essay should present a clear and concise thesis statement that outlines the main argument or purpose. Argument Development: The argument should be logical, coherent, and well-developed throughout the essay. Critical Analysis: Demonstrates critical thinking by engaging with different perspectives, theories, and concepts relevant to cultural anthropology. **Content and Understanding** Relevance to Topic: The essay should stay focused on the assigned topic or research question. Depth of Knowledge: Shows thorough understanding of the subject matter, including key theories, concepts, and anthropological debates. Use of Evidence: Utilizes appropriate and varied sources to support arguments, including ethnographic examples, scholarly articles, and other relevant materials. **Research and Sources** Quality of Sources: Employs credible and scholarly sources, with an emphasis on primary and peer-reviewed materials. Integration of Sources: Integrates sources effectively into the argument, demonstrating how they support or challenge the thesis. Citation and Referencing: Correctly cites all sources using the appropriate referencing style (e.g., APA, Chicago, MLA) and includes a complete bibliography. **Organization and Structure** Logical Flow: The essay should have a clear and logical structure, with well-organized paragraphs that each contribute to the overall argument. Introduction and Conclusion: Includes a strong introduction that sets up the essay and a conclusion that summarizes key points and restates the significance of the argument. Transitions: Uses effective transitions between paragraphs and sections to maintain coherence. **Writing Quality** Clarity and Precision: Writing is clear, concise, and precise, avoiding unnecessary jargon and complex sentences. Grammar and Syntax: Correct grammar, punctuation, and syntax, with minimal errors. Style and Tone: Appropriate academic style and tone for an anthropological essay. **Originality and Creativity** Original Thought: Displays original thinking and insights, rather than merely summarizing existing literature.
